###### **Introduction**

Feedback is an essential element of the learning process. The University collects the feedback on various curriculum aspects and courses from different stakeholders such as the students, Faculty, through online. The feedback collected from the individuals has been analysed and taken to the consideration for the development of curriculum, teaching learning process.

The Students' Feedback on curriculum and teaching learning process at TCAS, Our Campus to get formative feedback from students that can be used towards the improvements in the quality of course design and delivery, as well as student learning experiences. For the academic year 2020-2021, students' feedback is sought from around 441 students about the curriculum and teaching learning process. Majority of the student population (48%) agreed that our questions and student (27%) Strongly agreed that our questions. Majority of the students agreed that the syllabus is covered by the teachers on time. Around (75%) of the students agreed that the content provided in the syllabus is well sequenced and equipped them with necessary technical skills required for their professional areas. It is observed that (75%) of the respondents agreed that the teacher possesses deep knowledge of the subject taught. The students' feedback revealed that (45%) of them agreed and (30%) strongly agreed to the point that the teacher communicates clearly and the teacher inspires me by his/her knowledge in the subject. Also, majority of students (75%) agreed the teacher covers the entire syllabus and the teacher discusses topics in detail and the teacher engages the class for the full duration and completes the course in time. Here good feedback (63% agreed) for the teacher provides guidance counselling in academic and non-academic matters in/outside the class.

❖ Curriculum Development

For UG and PG, we follow the syllabus prescribed by KSKV Kachchh University, Bhuj. New syllabus and question paper structure prepared by unit wise was introduced by the university in the year 2016-17. New syllabus is being formed and will be introduced in 2021-22.

#### ❖ Examination and Evaluation

Internal and University exams are held at the end of each semester.

Besides written internal exams, students were assigned assignments / projects / seminars / viva etc. Internal 10 marks are counted on the basis of their performances. Due to pandemic situation, online tests were conducted comprising of multiple-choice questions in January 2020<sup>1</sup> for internal examination through HireMee Agency.
